CROWN

The light crown shifts weight low. Long irons have more sole mass positioned low and rear than short irons to aid trajectory.

BACK WEIGHT

A fixed 15-gram tungste plug stabilize the head and helps shots launch high.

SOLE

The contoured sole, with large center rail, is designed to handle iffy lies.

CLUBHEAD

The forged face contributes to overall feel. Pictured here is the strong-lofted (45°) pitching wedge.

# Tour Edge Bazooka QL IRON-WOODS

Hybrids evolved to replace hard-to-hit long irons. But can you kiss your standard short irons goodbye, too?

You can look at Tour Edge's full set of hybrid irons as the next logical evolutionary step for players who struggle with every iron, not just the long ones. The firm's Bazooka QL Iron-woods are hybrids from the 3-iron clear through to the pitching wedge. (Cleveland HiBore irons have the same makeup.) The concept behind Bazooka QL (Quick Launch) is right on the mark for slower swingers and/or higher handicappers.
